- 7. Visit any of the old cemeteries in the county. In our county library there is information listing many of them. List the most interesting tombstone that you find. Did you know that there is a veteran of the War of 1812 buried in one of them?
- 8. Locate any of the remaining county school houses. You may want to take a picture of them. At one time there were 26 of them in the county.
- 9. Become more familiar with your county by driving on 5 of these 10 Robertson County roads. You might consider bicycling some of them. Robertson County has around 100 miles of county roads.
